president and director's message

The word **transition** is defined as "the process or a period of changing from one state or condition to another." Going into fiscal year 2020, the Museum was preparing for an orderly leadership transition with Director Lora Urbanelli's planned retirement, and the Board of Trustees began a nationwide search for a new Director. When the COVID-19 pandemic struck, we were forced to make another unexpected transition-switching from physical to virtual operations and suspending the search process for MAM's next Director. Anticipating an extended disruption and given the need for steady leadership, the Board appointed an Interim Director. With his deep understanding of the institution, strong relationships with both MAM's staff and board, and background in finance, photography and arts education, Ira Wagner was the unanimous choice.

Transitions can be difficult, presenting unforeseen challenges requiring courage, teamwork and innovation. Fiscal year 2020 will certainly be one for the history books. We are very proud of how the entire MAM team rose to the challenge of this unprecedented period to create new artistic, educational and community-service opportunities for our members and the greater community. After closing our doors in March, the Museum's talented and dedicated staff deftly transitioned to online operations, and within just weeks was offering engaging virtual content and educational programming to our community and beyond.

This Annual Report is dedicated to the incomparable MAM team-staff, trustees, volunteers, teachers and supporters-and presents the Museum's progress with respect to fiscal, programmatic and operating matters. We also describe the Museum's important initiatives with regard to diversity, equity, accessibility and inclusion. For decades, MAM has worked to broaden its foundational multi-cultural art collections; allow art and artists to challenge, inspire and educate; both serve and give voice to underrepresented communities and disadvantaged individuals; and open the Museum's programs and facilities to all.

MAM's galleries hosted three groundbreaking exhibitions in FY2020. The fall season opened with *Impossible Shadows: The Art of Larry Kagan*, an exhibition of the work of contemporary American artist Larry Kagan. Kagan's abstract steel sculptures challenge the viewer to interpret what the work is meant to convey. When these sculptures are illuminated, a magical transformation occurs-the abstract shapes become shadow-cast images ranging from Barack Obama to a gigantic mosquito. *Impossible Shadows: The Art of Larry Kagan* was Kagan's first solo exhibition in New Jersey and one of his few museum shows in the tri-state region.

president and director's message

Virgil Ortiz: Odyssey of the Venutian Soldiers was another great success. Inspired by the 1680 Pueblo Revolt near today's Santa Fe, New Mexico, renowned Native American artist Virgil Ortiz' pottery and glass figurines become integral players in a futuristic story of social justice. A monumental lightbox in Laurie Art Stairway features the leaders of an imagined revolt in the year 2180, searching for survivors after a nuclear apocalypse and striving to continue the Pueblo way of life. Combining his life-long passion for science fiction with artwork inspired by traditional Pueblo techniques, Ortiz' artwork brings both past and future to life.

Federico Uribe: Animalia opened in February 2020, attracting thousands of visitors of all ages to view Uribe's brightly colored environments and life-sized animal sculptures. The 60+ pieces in this unique, site-specific exhibition flawlessly convey the breadth and depth of Uribe's work. *Plastic Coral Reef,* composed of hundreds of pieces of plastic waste to raise awareness of the effects of pollution on marine ecosystems worldwide, was a standout and visitor favorite. Given that the Museum was forced to close its doors just a month after the opening, we are thrilled that Uribe has allowed MAM to extend this family-favorite exhibition through January 3, 2021.

MAM also reached into its extensive permanent collection of American and Native American art to present *Uncaged: Animals in the Collection,* an exploration of the variety of ways artists engage with animal imagery in their work. This exhibition will remain on view to August 2021. Finally, the Museum worked with artists in our community to present *Personal Landscapes,* featuring recent work by Essex County artists interpreting their own response to the internal and outside landscape. Together, these exhibitions represent the best of MAM-a diverse presentation of established and emerging artists, a thoughtful installation based on our permanent collection and our engagement with our vibrant local arts community.

During the fourth quarter of FY2020, the MAM team focused on surviving and adapting to the pandemic. We took decisive and often difficult steps to preserve the Museum's assets and protect its human and financial resources. We then successfully pivoted to Virtual MAM, with a new website offering a range of content allowing online visitors to continue to experience amazing artwork, engaging instructors and inspiring artists. The Yard School of Art, the studio component of the Vance Wall Art Education Center, began offering art-making classes and camps online, reaching over 1,000 students and campers from the region along with a growing enrollment from outside of New Jersey. During the lockdown, MAM's team also photographed all of our galleries, enabling us to offer guided 3-D virtual tours to school-age, adult and senior viewers. Record numbers now enjoy MAM's art and cultural observations via social media. We also launched the popular *MAM Conversations* evening series, in which thousands have now visited artists virtually in their studios to observe their work and creative process. As we move forward, MAM is building on these programs to encourage our diverse, increasingly far-flung audience to engage in art however they feel most comfortable – live or virtual.

Our Museum is blessed with an exceptional team: 100 dedicated staff associates and instructors, 45 incomparable trustees, an extraordinary keystone benefactor in the Vance Wall Foundation, wise and courageous officers, an art-loving, progressive community, and over 3,000 beloved volunteers and members.

Like many nonprofits, MAM depends on the sustained generosity of both institutional and private donors. This year, more than ever, your support has been indispensable in allowing MAM to continue its second-century mission of inspiring and engaging people of all ages, backgrounds and abilities in their experience with art.

awards and accomplishments

DEVELOPMENT

• In FY20, MAM announced new virtual benefits for members, including MAM Conversations and curator-led tours, as well as created weekly email/newsletters for members, and renamed two Special Interest Groups, including **Friends of Contemporary Art** (FoCA, formerly MAM Contemporaries) and Friends of Native American Art (FoNAA, formerly Rand Forum). MAM also saw its most popular Family Day to date on November 10, 2019, with a record one-day participation of 912.

• MAM was awarded our highest-ever onetime foundation grant this year: a \$320,000 grant from the Henry Luce Foundation to support our Native American Art Collection. The grant will support a project to develop new strategies for the presentation of MAM's collection of the Native Art of North America in our Rand Gallery and throughout the Museum. With key goals to engage current, innovative ideas about Indigenous communities with art museum collections and exhibitions, this project seeks to indigenize the curatorial process, making decisions collaboratively from the start. The grant will fund the necessary project personnel, honoraria, and travel expenses to develop and execute key principal activities of an Advisory Board for Native American Art, a Project Curator of Native American Art, and two scholarly assemblies over a three-year period.





EDUCATION

• Now in its fifth year, the **Vance Wall Art** Education Center encompasses all our educational efforts, including the Yard School of Art, and engages with over 123 schools in 30 school districts, 5 institutions of higher learning, and 6 community and business organizations.

• In our Yard School of Art, more than 1,500 students of all ages took one or more of 124 classes, 50 camp classes, and 58 workshops, MAM awarded 39 need-based scholarships. The Yard School's Ceramics Studio remains the only resource of its kind at a Museum in NJ, and our Digital Media Lab has proven to be highly successful at attracting new students.

• MAM is proud to be a family-friendly institution. CREATEabilities, Family Day, Homeschool Days, Drop-in Studio, Building Montclair in Lego, and SummerART are just a few of MAM's programs that continue to provide excellent art opportunities to the youngest members of our community.

• The Scholastic Art Awards attracted 3,570 submissions, nearly triple the 1,500 submissions MAM received when we began this national partnership in 2009. In FY20, 1,096 of our students were awarded the NJ Regional Gold Key, Silver Key or Honorable Mention Awards. Scholastic national winners from the Northern New Jersey region participated in an online MAM Conversations talk through MAM's Virtual MAM platform. Executive Director of the Alliance for Young Artists and Writers, Christopher Wisniewski, joined the panel. This year marked MAM's 11th as region affiliate for the Scholastic Art Awards.

• The Yard School of Art's **SummerART** was voted #1 in the 2020 JerseyArts.com People's Choice Awards for Favorite Visual Arts Camp for the sixth year in a row!

EXHIBITIONS

• Constructing Identity in America (1766 – 2017) addressed a variety of characteristics that contribute to one's sense of self, including civic, cultural, artistic, religious, professional, and sociopolitical identities, sense of place and personal space, and non-conformity.

• In *Impossible Shadows: The Art of Larry Kagan,* the artist used twisted steel, light and cast shadows to create an exciting experience of seeing things in a whole new way.

• Undaunted Spirit: Art of Native North America traced the evolution of Native art by revealing human stories that tell of the great resiliency of Indian artists and how they maintained their artistic traditions while adapting to everchanging conditions.

COMMUNITY

• MAM established a **Diversity, Equity,** Accessibility and Inclusion (DEAI) Committee of community members, staff, and trustees, headed by MAM Board Vice Presidents Sharon Taylor and Michael Heningburg, to solidify our commitment to equity within all areas of the Museum and its programming.

• MAM's 7th year of the **Art Truck**, a mobile open studio, housed in a retrofitted ice cream truck, that serves free art projects and lessons to MAM's community served over 7 visits, 784 visitors, and 5 towns. It also helps to raise awareness of the importance of art making and creative endeavors as integral to lifelong wellbeing.

• MAM's **Free First Thursday Nights**, an initiative which MAM offers late hours from 5-9 PM the first Thursday of the month from October-March, with free admission, dynamic programming, live music, tours, and a fullservice bar saw 2,700 visitors over five nights in FY20, with an average weekly attendance of 550.

• Over 150 **guided tours** took place this year serving 4,400 students and adults, with over 20% of school tours reaching underserved communities.

Committee (AACC) offered three lively
community programs welcoming a total of
over 450 people - Broadway Bound with
Reg E. Gaines, the 13th Annual Film Forum in
collaboration with Women in Media-Newark,
and Art Meets Jazz with Reggie Workman.

Board of Trustees in September 2020.



Since its founding over 100 years ago, the Museum has been inspired and nourished by the artists in its community. MAM continued that tradition by featuring recent work by artists from Essex County in this exhibition. The rich diversity of media and quality of work represented is a testament to the talent and creativity of our local artists. Whether a representation of physical space, or a map of the complex inner workings of the mind, these artists have interpreted their own personal landscapes in a variety of ways.

Uncaged: Animals in the Collection exhibition segment

Constructing Identity in America (1766–2017)



This wide-ranging show of more than 80 paintings, sculptures, and works on paper, drawn primarily from MAM's esteemed collection, addresses a variety of characteristics that contribute to one's sense of self: civic, cultural, artistic, religious, professional, and sociopolitical identities; sense of place and personal space; and non-conformity. Portraits range from Charles Willson Peale's *Portrait of George Washington* (1783) and John Singer Sargent's *Ernest-Ange Duez* (1884) to Alice Neel's *Isabel Bishop* (1974) and Catherine Opie's *Jo* (1993). This exhibition goes far beyond portraits to explore a sense of self. Additional works address the impact of geography upon identity, as well as defining moments of social activism.

Undaunted Spirit: Art of Native North America



The present exhibition in the Rand Gallery, *Undaunted Spirit: Native Art of North America*, traces the evolution of Native art by revealing human stories that tell of the great resiliency of Native American artists and how they maintained their artistic traditions while adapting to ever-changing, often oppressive, conditions. Much of the artwork in this exhibition captures the undaunted spirit of artists who endured dire consequences of European colonialism. Despite loss of lands, forced religious conversion, and the introduction of foreign diseases for which they had no immunity, Native Americans have survived and continue to create exceptional works of art.



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
